


IN LOVING MEMORY

Unfortunately many people who saw the cute puppies in the 1996 movie ran out and purchased a dalmation without thinking of the consequences of owning a dog, let alone a dalmation which is an active and social dog with quite a personality. Animal shelters and rescues were overrun with these wonderful animals. Guinea pig/small animal rescues are holding their breath that in the months after G-Force, the same thing does not happen with hastily bought guinea pigs, especially for children who quickly lose interest once the novelty of the movie and the work of taking care of a pet wear off. What can you do? Continue the good work that the Critter Corral has been doing in educating the public. If you know of someone thinking of getting a guinea pig, encourage adoption and talk to them about the responsibilities of owning a cavy. See if your local movie theatre might let you post a flyer about guinea pig adoption in their lobby. Continue to encourage pet stores to stop selling animalsspeak to managers or write letters. Post flyers in your local vet office promoting the Critter Corral. Continue to volunteer your time and send in your donations to the Critter Corral. Each adoption event or other opportunity to get out into the community is invaluable. Thank you to each of you for your continuing support!

HOW YOU CAN HELP THE CRITTER CORRAL
